Note: All Economics majors must take MATH 115 or MATH 121 in partial fulfillment of graduation requirements. Transfer students majoring in Economics must present or complete these courses, even though they have an Associate degree where all General Education Requirements have been waived.

Students interested in taking EHS 431, 432, or 433 may need to take EHS 211 and EHS 212 as prerequisites, and should consult with their advisors prior to registering for these courses.

- York students are required to complete (pass) three (3) Writing intensive (WI) courses: two (2) in the lower division (100-200 level) and one (1) in the upper division (300-level).
- If you transferred to York College with an Associate's degree (AA, AS, AAS), or with credit for General Education requirements, you are exempt from completing two (2) of your WI courses. You must still complete one (1) WI course in the upper division within your major. If your major has no upper division WI course, you must take a WI course chosen in consultation with your major advisor.
- B.A. students must complete 90 credits of liberal arts – See Bulletin.
- Students are strongly encouraged to select a Minor program of study, in consultation with an academic advisor, especially those planning to attend graduate school. Minor courses would replace the “free electives” in the Major Plan.
