Last summer Senate Democratic Leader **Malcolm Smith** (D-St.Albans) appointed me to Governor Spitzer's Higher Education Commission (HEC). Comprising of public and private universities, assembly members and even a student, the Commission presented Governor Spitzer with its findings to ramp up higher education by, among other things, shoring up education for the K thorough 12 set. The governor is now in the process of adapting the Commission's proposal starting this fiscal year and invited me to a press conference in Albany earlier this week where we announced the formation of a \$4 billion endowment fund for CUNY and SUNY schools throughout the state.

We wish them all the very best and look forward to touting their successes in this same space next year.

Provost Ivelaw Lloyd Griffith continues his scholarly engagement in international forums on crime, drugs, and terrorism, his areas of expertise. Earlier this week he participated in a discussion via satellite on the international drug trade and its multi-national corporatist dimensions. The host of the Hot 102 FM program was veteran journalist and former First Lady of Jamaica, Beverly Anderson Manley. In a few weeks Dr. Griffith will be the guest of the Canadian Defense Ministry to speak at a meeting in

Barbados to prepare for the 2008 Meeting of the Defense Ministers of the Americas, being held this fall in Canada. Last fall Provost Griffith was invited to deliver the Keynote Address at the Second Annual Conference on Military Intelligence in the Caribbean, hosted by the United States Southern Command and held in the Dominican Republic. The Provost plans to develop and teach a course on global terrorism this fall at York.

Professor James Como of the Performing and Fine Arts has once again proven himself the definitive C.S. Lewis scholar, earning a feature review, "Arc of surrender: The Collected Letters of C. S. Lewis," *The New Criterion*, 25:7 (March 2007), pp. 60-64; "Culture and Philosophy: Another

C. S. Lewis Plenary Address," October 27, 2007 and C. S. Lewis: The Man and His Work, October 26-27, 2007, Southeastern College at Wake Forest.

Professor Donald Auriemma (Occupational Therapy) is leading the charge to make York's Green Initiative a model for the City University of New York. He has formed the Green Initiative to study and implement programs such as parking for hybrid vehicles, bike racks and recycling programs. Soon there will also be a complete overhaul of our lighting system in the atrium and cafeteria area.

Dr. Dana Fusco (Academic Affairs) has just had an article accepted for publication in the *Journal of Research in Childhood Education*: "School vs. After school: A Study of Equity in Supporting Children's Development."

Professor Deborah Majerovitz (Psychology) and Prof. David Ajuluchukwu (Gerontology) collaborated on a presentation at the Annual Meeting of the Gerontological Society of America in November, 2007. The title of the presentation was: "Perceptions of Elder Care in an International College Setting in New York City." Professor Majerovitz also has an article forthcoming in the peer-reviewed journal, *Health Communication*. This work was done in collaboration with the Long Term Care Community Coalition of New York State, a non-profit community-based advocacy group for long term care reform and legislation.

Professor Glenn Lewis (English) has been selected to serve on the initial **Governance Council (governing body)** for the CUNY Graduate School of Journalism. He is one of only two Consortial Faculty members to be appointed. He will also serve on the four-member **Faculty Standards Committee.** The Committee is responsible for making recommendations to the Dean and Council on hiring and retention standards for full-timers, Consortial faculty and adjuncts; standards for promotion and granting tenure; and qualifications for each level of faculty member. Prof. Lewis also continues to appear as a commentator on Fox 5 News discussing everything from Arab TV coming into the US to Super Tuesday.

Professor Scott Sheidlower (Library) presented a talk on teaching the disabled as part of an Instructional Section contemporary issues discussion sponsored by the Association of College & Research Libraries (ACRL) at the American Library Association's (ALA) midwinter conference in Philadelphia in the winter of 2008. Additionally he presented a paper about teaching information literacy to millennials of lower SES at the Georgia Information Literacy Conference in Savannah, Georgia, sponsored by Southern Georgia University, in the fall of 2007.
